#### EMERGENCY PROCEDURES AND CLOSINGS

## In case of a life threatening situation, dial 911.

If life is in danger, please EVACUATE the building in a calm manner—DO NOT RUN. Please help those who need assistance due to physical impairment. There are two exit doors located on the first floor.

#### FIRST FLOOR

Exit the stairwell and proceed to the nearest exit. From the stairwell, evacuate to the NE corner of the building WITHOUT crossing the street.

#### REPORTING AN EMERGENCY

If a non-life threatening emergency occurs, please contact the security officer at 303.944.7637 if assistance is required. For all emergencies, dial 911.

#### FIRES

All students are urged to acquaint themselves with the location of the exits and fire alarm devices on each floor. In case of fire, please call 911 immediately. Thereafter, please activate the nearest fire alarm pull station device to evacuate the building. There are several located throughout the building. Remember, current fire code mandates that all elevators recall to the ground floor in the event of any fire alarm activation.

#### POLICE

To summon the police, call 911.

#### **BUILDING SECURITY**

The building is protected by an intrusion detection system and extensively monitored with closed circuit security cameras. Uniformed security officers are also on the premises from open to close.

#### **THEFT**

# LIBRARY INFORMATION COMMONS, COMPUTER LAB, AND TEXTBOOKS

The library, also known as the Information Commons or the Commons at Argosy University, Denver houses the library services. Access to our book catalog, full-text journal articles, electronic books (e-books) and dissertations are also available to students by going to the student portal. Click on "Launch Library".

## REFERENCE SERVICES

The Commons provides Reference Service to students on a drop-in basis, by phone, by email, or by appointment. Email: <a href="mailto:nansmith@argosy.edu">nansmith@argosy.edu</a> or phone 303.923.4150 for further information or to set up an appointment with a librarian.

The Commons' staff will hold *orientations* for all programs when requested by faculty. Research training sessions can be held in the Argosy University computer lab or the Commons. Trainings include searching the library databases. Commons' staff can also work with students one-on-one for advanced training in research and APA format skills. In addition, many class text books are on reserve in the Commons.

#### COLLECTION

Books may be checked out for two weeks while journals are for library use only. Quiet study and group study rooms are available. Audio/visual resources are available in the group study room. Wireless Internet is available throughout the campus.

#### **ONLINE CATALOG**

The Voyager catalog is available through the student portal.

The catalog also provides links to over 26,000 electronic books (fully digitized and available online).

## **INTERLIBRARY LOAN (ILL)**

The Commons offers inter-library loan service through a nation-wide library network as well as with the other 18 Argosy University campuses.

# SECTION FOUR

## STUDENT SERVICES AND RESOURCES

## REGISTRATION

Argosy University, Denver offers online registration through the student portal, as well as in-person registration with their academic advisor.

#### REGISTRATION DEADLINES AND DATES

In order to provide flexibility of registration options, there are several registration deadlines and dates which vary depending upon the student's payment method, status and program.

#### 1. Payment Deadlines:

- a. Students applying for financial aid must have a complete and approved financial aid application prior to the registration period. If financial aid does not cover the total tuition and fees for the registration period, students must provide an additional payment method through the Payment Arrangement Form.
- **b.** Students not receiving financial aid must provide a Payment Arrangement Form with a valid form of payment during registration. Students will have to provide a credit card number to register without financial aid.

## 2. Late Registration:

Students are assessed a \$50 late registration fee if they register during the late registration period.

## 3. Registration changes:

Students may change their registration online during the online registration period. After online registration is over, students must complete an Add/Drop Form and submit it to their Academic Advisor Students who make changes to their schedule after the start of the term will need the signature of their program chair to add a class. There is a \$50 fee for dropping a class after the start of the term. The Add/Drop Form and the *Academic Catalog* outline the impact of adding and dropping classes on students' grades, financial aid, international status, and VA benefits.

#### 4. Course Availability/Cancellation:

While Argosy University makes every effort to provide sufficient course sections for students, Argosy University reserves the right to cancel any course. Students enrolled in canceled courses will be granted a full refund and will be allowed to add a course. Enrollment in a particular course section or with a specific instructor is not guaranteed. Course instructors may change at the discretion of Argosy University.

## 5. Payment Deadlines:

Students are subject to payment deadlines as outlined in the *Academic Catalog*. These policies require your student account to be paid in full prior to registration. A payment plan or approved financial aid application must be on file prior to registration.

#### 6. Holds:

Students must clear all holds on their account prior to registering. Holds may be placed on student accounts for incomplete registration, incomplete admissions or financial documentation, balances on their accounts from previous terms, incomplete financial aid, and library materials not returned. Students must contact the appropriate department to clear a hold on their account.

#### COURSE TRANSFERS AND WAIVERS

#### GRADUATE TRANSFER CREDITS

Graduate transfer credit criteria are outlined in the *Argosy University Academic Catalog*. In order to have credits evaluated for transfer to a graduate level program at Argosy University, the following steps will be followed:

- Students must submit a Course Transfer Form to the Student Services Department for each transfer course requested. Attached to the form should be an official transcript, a course syllabus, and additional documentation as needed. This form needs to be submitted within one year of matriculation into the program. Incomplete forms will be returned to the student.
- 2. The Student Services Department will review the form to see if it meets the general criteria for a transfer. If these criteria are met, the form will then be submitted to the appropriate academic department for review. Course transfers will be either approved, denied or more information will be requested.

#### UNDERGRADUATE TRANSFER CREDITS

Undergraduate transfer credit criteria are outlined in the *Argosy University Academic Catalog*. Transfer credit evaluation is initiated during the admissions process. The student will be advised of the number of transfer credits identified for credit toward their Argosy University, Denver degree program.

#### WAIVER/COURSE SUBSTITUTION

Waiver/course substitution criteria are outlined in the *Academic Catalog*. In order to have credits evaluated for waiver to a program at Argosy University, Denver, students must submit a Course Waiver Form for each course waiver requested. Waived courses do not reduce the number of courses required to be taken in-residence.

#### COURSES TAKEN AT OTHER ARGOSY UNIVERSITY CAMPUSES

With prior approval of their program chair, matriculated students may be able to apply courses taken at another Argosy University campus to their degree program at Argosy University, Denver. Please see the *Academic Catalog* for detailed information on this subject.

## **STUDENT FINANCE**

The Student Finance office is available to answer questions about financial aid, billing issues, payment plans, grants, and scholarships. All forms and links to financial aid applications and resources can be found in the Student Finance Office. Please also review the "Financial Policies and Assistance" section of the *Academic Catalog* for current financial responsibilities to ensure registration completion.

#### DISABILITIES

Argosy University, Denver provides accommodations to qualified students with disabilities. The Disability Services office assists qualified students with disabilities in acquiring reasonable and appropriate accommodations and in supporting their success at Argosy University, Denver.

## TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS

Students may print their unofficial transcripts through the Student Portal under My Self Service. Students may also request official transcripts and enrollment verifications by completing a Release of Information/Transcript Request form. Transcripts are free of charge with normal processing and delivery times. Rush requests require a \$20 fee to be processed in one to two business days.

#### INFORMATION CHANGES

It is the student's responsibility to report all changes in name and address to the Student Services/ Student Finance office. Students request changes through the student portal or with a Change of Information form. Please allow one week for updates.

## RELEASE OF INFORMATION

Students needing any type of information released to a third party including financial statements, degree verifications, enrollment verification or a billing statement must fill out a Release of Information Form to Student Services or Student Finance.

#### STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE

Optional health insurance is available to students through an outside agency. Contact Student Services for information.

#### STUDENT EVALUATIONS AND SURVEYS

Students will be given confidential end-of-term course evaluations at the completion of each course. These confidential surveys are used to track progress and provide feedback to instructors. Student feedback is essential to providing quality instruction. Annual student satisfaction surveys are also conducted to provide the administration with valuable feedback essential to providing quality services, programs and facilities.

## **GRADUATION**

#### PETITION TO GRADUATE

Specific Program Graduation Requirements are outlined in the *Argosy University Academic Catalog*.

- 1. Students who are planning to graduate need to submit a Petition to Graduate Form with \$175.00 graduation fee to Student Services by the first day of the last semester in which they register. Late or incomplete petitions will not be processed and delay graduation until the following semester.
- 2. Potential graduate academic records are reviewed at the end of semester in which the student petitions to graduate after all grades for the semester have been received.
- 3. It is the student's responsibility to make sure all "Incomplete" and "In-Progress" grades are changed as well as all program requirements including meeting their practicum, internship and dissertation requirements by the end of the term in which they graduate. Students are encouraged to review their academic transcripts every semester.
- Students are allowed to walk in the commencement ceremony when they have completed all
  their program requirements by the end of the semester in which they petition to graduate.

#### **DIPLOMAS**

Diplomas are ordered once every semester for students that graduate that semester. Diplomas take approximately two months to be processed.

#### COMMENCEMENT

Commencement ceremonies are held for students annually at the end of the fall semester. Students that have petitioned to graduate will be notified of the details for commencement ceremonies.

## DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE AND CAMPUS

The use of illegal drugs and the abuse of alcohol on Argosy University, Denver or in facilities controlled by the Argosy University, Denver are prohibited by college regulations and are incompatible with the Argosy University, Denver goal of providing a healthy educational environment for students, faculty, staff and guests. The following information is provided in compliance with the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989.

#### EFFECTS OF DRUGS AND ALCOHOL

Although individuals often use drugs and alcohol to achieve a variety of effects on mind and body that are found to be temporarily useful or pleasurable, drugs can be highly addictive and injurious. A person can pay a price in terms of his or her physical, emotional, and social health.

This price can be paid in a number of ways. The risk of contracting sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS, is increased through unwanted or unprotected sex when one is under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Drugs can be the trigger for violent crime. Economic and legal problems usually follow directly when one tries to support a drug habit by resorting to crime. The dependence, illness, loss of job, and loss of family or friends that can result from drug or alcohol use and abuse can be tragic.

In keeping with the mission of Argosy University, Denver and the requirements of state and federal law Argosy University, Denver has adopted this program to ensure a drug-free campus and workplace and to prevent the use of controlled substances and the abuse of alcohol.

## HEALTH RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH THE USE OF ALCOHOL

#### Short-Term Risks

- Increased risks of accidents and injuries
- Alcohol-related traffic accidents (the leading cause of death for teens)
- Alcohol slows reaction time, decreases muscle coordination, and impairs vision
- Fatal overdose
- Unconsciousness or blackout
- Death by aspiration of vomit
- Nausea
- Gastritis

#### Long-Term Risks

- Increased blood pressure
- · Increased risk of heart attack
- Brain damage resulting in permanent psychosis
- Cancer of the mouth, esophagus or stomach
- Liver damage (cirrhosis, alcohol hepatitis, cancer)

- · Ulcers and gastritis
- Pancreatitis
- · Birth defects
- In males—testicular atrophy and breast enlargement
- In females—increased risk of breast cancer
- Prolonged, excessive drinking can shorten life span by 10 12 years.

## **HEALTH RISKS ASSOCIATED WITH THE USE OF DRUGS**

## Amphetamines (Speed, Uppers)

- Malnutrition
- Hallucinations
- · Dependence, psychological and sometimes physical

## **Deliriants (Aerosols, Lighter Fluid, Paint Thinner)**

- Permanent damage to lungs, brain, liver, bone marrow
- Loss of coordination, confusion, hallucinations
- Overdose causing convulsions, death

## Depressants (Barbiturates, Tranquilizers, Methaqualone)

- Confusion, depression, loss of coordination
- · Dependence, physical and psychological
- Coma, death (caused by overdose)
- Can be lethal when combined with alcohol

## Hallucinogens (LSD, PCP, DMT, STP, Mescaline)

- Hallucinations, panic, irrational behaviors (which can lead to increased risk of accidents, injuries)
- Tolerance overdose leading to convulsions, coma, death
- Possible birth defects in children of LSD users

## **Intravenous Drug Use**

• Places one at risk for HIV infection (the virus causing AIDS) when needles are shared

## Marijuana and Hashish

- Chronic bronchitis
- Decreased vital capacity
- Increased risk of lung cancer
- In men—lower levels of testosterone and increase in abnormal sperm count

## **Stimulants (Cocaine)**

- Painful nosebleeds and nasal erosion
- Intense "downs" that result in physical and/or emotional discomfort
- Tolerance and physical dependence can develop

## Narcotics (Heroin, Morphine, Codeine, Opium)

- Malnutrition
- Hepatitis
- · Loss of judgment and self-control leading to increased risk of accidents, injuries
- Dependence
- · Overdose leading to convulsions, coma, death

#### **SANCTIONS**

#### ARGOSY UNIVERSITY, DENVER SANCTIONS

Argosy University, Denver in all of its actions, seeks to uphold local, state and federal laws. Insofar as permitted by these laws, the Argosy University, Denver will apply sanctions that could lead to a student being fined, suspended or expelled or an employee being disciplined, suspended or dismissed for violation of the Argosy University, Denver standards of conduct. Students and employees may also be referred for prosecution. Disciplinary sanctions may include the completion of an appropriate rehabilitation program at the student's or employee's expense, if necessary.

#### FEDERAL SANCTIONS

Federal penalties and sanctions for illegal possession of a controlled substance include the following:

First conviction Up to 1 year in prison, fine of \$1,000 to \$100,000, or both

**Second conviction** At least 15 days and up to 2 years imprisonment, \$5,000 to \$250,000 fine, or both

After two drug convictions At least 90 days and up to 3 years in prison, \$5,000 to \$250,000 fine, or both. Special federal sentencing provisions for possession of crack cocaine include a mandatory prison term of at least 5 years and up to 20 years, fine of up to \$250,000, or both, for a first conviction if the amount of crack exceeds 5 grams, for a second conviction if amount exceeds 3 grams, and for a third or subsequent conviction if the amount exceeds 1 gram.

Additional federal sanctions may also apply including forfeiture of vehicles used to transport controlled substances, denial of federal benefits including student loans, grants, and contracts and denial or revocation of certain federal licenses and benefits.

#### STATE OF COLORADO SANCTIONS

State criminal statues (which may be generally found under Titles 12 and 18 of the Colorado Revised statues) cover the same scope of conduct as the federal laws. Although the sentences and fines are generally less severe than federal law provides, life sentences are possible for repeat offenders. The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense (manufacture, sale or distribution) is 16 years in prison and a \$750,000.00 fine. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession or use of one ounce or less of marijuana) is a fine of \$100.00. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) apply equally to driving under the influence of drugs. Finally, local ordinances such as the Denver, Boulder, Longmont, Louisville and Lafayette municipal codes impose a variety of penalties. Secondary civil consequences may also flow from criminal drug violations. Property associated with the criminal acts, including vehicles and homes, can be confiscated by State or Federal governments. Individuals who are convicted of felony violations may be barred from governmental employment and from license professions such as law, medicine and teaching.

#### STATE OF COLORADO ALCOHOL LAWS

State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession and use of alcohol may be found in Title 12 of the Colorado Revised Statues. Perhaps the most significant aspect is the prohibition of the distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21, to a visibly intoxicated person, or to a known alcoholic.

State laws also prohibit any form of assistance to these categories of people in obtaining alcoholic beverages. Violation of these laws is a misdemeanor punishable by fine of \$1,000.00 and jail sentences of a year. However, such conduct may, in some circumstances, constitute contributing to the delinquency of a minor and it could then be determined to be a felony offense punishable by an eight-year prison sentence and a \$500,000.00 fine. Secondary civil consequences for liquor law violations may include ineligibility for liquor and driver's licenses.

Criminal sanctions also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or other drugs. Under Section 42-4-1301 (1) (a), Colorado Revised statues, the maximum penalty for such an act is two years in jail and a \$5,000.00 fine.

If a person is injured as a result of someone operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and/or other drugs, the act is a felony punishable by four years in prison and a \$100,000.00 fine. If a person is killed, the sentence can be eight years in prison with a \$500,000.00 fine. All such convictions also result in the revocation of driving privileges.

State law requires drivers who are stopped by the police for suspected violation of this law to submit to scientific test that determine the amount of alcohol in their blood and individuals who refuse to be tested automatically lose their driver's license.

Remember, one need not to be "out of control" to be "under the influence." A substantial effect on physical capability is all that is required. Chemical test results combined with the testimony of an expert toxicologist can result in a conviction even when some people may feel minimally intoxicated. In addition, individuals may face a variety of penalties imposed by municipal ordinances.

*Note:* This description is intended only to give those who read it a basic, general understanding of the range of serious legal sanctions, which can arise from the unlawful possession, distribution and/or use of illicit drugs and alcohol. Individuals who are concerned about specific circumstances should seek the advice of their personal attorney.

#### CONVICTIONS FOR DRUG-RELATED OFFENSES

Any student convicted of any drug-related criminal statute must notify the director of Student Services, in writing, no later than five (5) days after such conviction regardless of where the offense occurred. This is because under federal and state laws, any student convicted of a drug-related felony offense must be denied all federal and state assistance, including Pell Grant. However, a criminal conviction shall not be necessary to find that a student has violated these standards of conduct, and the Argosy University, Denver need not, and ordinarily will not, defer its own actions and sanctions pending the outcome of any criminal proceeding.

#### SIGNS OF AN ALCOHOL OR ILLICIT DRUG PROBLEMS

Following is a listing of classic danger signals that may indicate the presence of a drug or alcohol problem:

- Abrupt changes in mood or attitude
- · Decreased efficiency at work or at school
- Frequent absences, tardiness, and/or early departures
- Relationship problems with family, friends, and co-workers
- Unusual outbursts of anger and hostility
- · Social withdrawal

#### **COUNSELING**

If you observe any of these changes in yourself or another student, you are encouraged to talk with a counselor. Abuse of alcohol or drugs can lead to dependency and addiction with serious consequences for personal health and overall quality of life. There are drug and alcohol counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation facilities available in our area where students and employees may seek advice and treatment. The director of Student Services can refer you to one that meets your needs.

Any student self-reporting a problem with alcohol or controlled substances to an Argosy University, Denver staff or faculty member before a violation occurs will not be formally sanctioned by Argosy University, Denver for disciplinary reasons (although self-reporting will not excuse academic problems). However, the student may be required to seek immediate treatment off campus.

Drug and alcohol counseling, treatment and rehabilitation facilities are available in our area where students and employees may seek advice and treatment. The director of Student Services can refer individuals to appropriate programs and services. A list of emergency and sliding-fee scale resources is available in the Student Services Department.
